Digital Diplomacy or e-Diplomacy is the utilization of the Information and Communication Technologies (ICTs) and the social media platforms like twitter, facebook, instagram, flickr and so on by a country to achieve its foreign policy objectives. The United States of America's State Department was the first foreign ministry to use e-Diplomacy for the conduct of its foreign affairs.
